Spotlight on Brazil

Brazil is blessed with some of the most generous natural resources on the planet: an enormous, fertile land mass that covers most of the South American continent, more unique plant and animal species than any country on the planet, and abundant oil and gas reserves. And while Brazil has long been the South American hegemon, in recent years, successful government policies have transformed the country into a global economic power. Its industrial sector, the second largest in the Americas, produces everything from automobiles and machinery to petrochemicals and consumer durables.

Moreover, in the past ten years, Brazil's leaders have sought to extend the benefits of its success to all Brazilians. The liberalization and opening of the economy has helped encourage the burgeoning middle class, and broad social reforms have reduced income inequality throughout the country. With more Brazilians taking part in the economy, the services sector has blossomed, and fiscal sustainability has become an attainable goal.

There is no doubt that Brazil is making a bid for a place on the global stage. The 2014 World Cup brought the world's eyes (and its journalists) to Brazil, for better and for worse. The issues that continue to plague the country—poverty, inflation, and crime—are juxtaposed against its natural beauty, growth, and promise. And the scrutiny that comes with the 2016 Summer Olympics is just around the corner. Brazil's season is now; the world is watching.

- Brazil shares boundaries with every South American country except Chile and Ecuador.
- Along with Russia, China, India, and South Africa, Brazil is a member of the BRIC countries, a group characterized by rapid growth and emerging middle classes.
- Brazil is one of the seventeen Megadiversity Countries, which were identified by Conservation International as harboring the majority of Earth's species.
- Brazil's football team has won the World Cup a record five times.

Sample Itinerary

Day 1 Arrive in São Paulo. Spend the day on your own exploring the incredible museums and culinary options of Brazil's cultural capital.

Day 8 Spend a free day exploring Rio's many attractions: listen to live samba and Bossa Nova music, stroll down Ipanema Beach, or relax with a cold *caipirinha*.

Day 9 Engage in your final two business visits, followed by a free evening for individual study and activity.
